

Restoring Hard Top Richard Geiger

Restoring a 1961 Corvette hardtop can be a daunting task, but it's an essential step to preserve its classic charm. If your hardtop's rubber seals are cracked, the plexiglass is scratched or dull, or there are cracks near the rivets, you have three main options:

- **Buy a replacement hardtop** outright for \$9,454 USD (\$13,977 AUD) * plus international shipping.
- Ship your hardtop to the U.S. for restoration at \$6,453 USD (\$9,540 AUD) * plus round-trip shipping.
- **Purchase a repair kit** for \$2,011 USD (\$2,973 AUD) * plus shipping. This kit includes rear plexiglass, side quarter windows, rubber seals, screws, and more.



A Word of Advice: Consider Professional Restoration

While the repair kit may seem like a cost-effective solution, restoring a Corvette hardtop yourself can be incredibly challenging. Based on my experience, I strongly recommend sending your hardtop to a U.S.-based specialist for restoration. Here's why:

My DIY Experience

In June 2021, I embarked on restoring my hardtop using a repair kit. The process was far from straightforward:

- 1. **Disassembly:** Removing parts like the header bar was tricky but manageable with patience.
- 2. **Replacing Seals and Windows:** Installing new seals and side quarter windows went relatively smoothly.
- 3. **Rear Window Installation:** This step proved to be the most challenging. The holes in the rubber seal didn't align properly with the window frame retainer, requiring me to drill new holes in the rubber —a defect acknowledged by the supplier.

Despite my best efforts, installing the rear window required more than two hands and specialised tools. Even professionals struggled; one auto shop attempted the job but returned it incomplete after charging \$300 and advising me not to disclose their involvement!

The Mental Toll

The project consumed countless hours and caused significant frustration. Each obstacle forced me to pause for days or even weeks to figure out my next steps.

Lessons Learned

• **Specialised Tools Are Essential:** Drilling plexiglass requires low-speed drills and lubrication (e.g., WD-40). Rivets demand tools like the Aero Rivet-II Tool (\$100 USD).



- **Precision Is Key:** Aligning steel retainers with rubber seals and securing them with studs and barrel nuts is painstaking work that requires patience and accuracy.
- **Professional Expertise Matters:** Specialists can complete these tasks efficiently without the trial-and-error that plagues DIY efforts.

Final Thoughts

Restoring a 1961 Corvette hardtop is not for the faint-hearted. Unless you have extensive experience and the right tools, outsourcing this task to professionals will save you time, money, and frustration.

While DIY might seem economical initially, unexpected challenges can quickly escalate costs and stress levels.






Figure 1. Crack in the rear corner of the plexiglass



Thank you, John, for making our NCRS experiences extraordinary.






Australian National Convention Parkes 2025



We loaded up both the cars Wendy & I in the C8 & Tony in Rocky




Our first stop was at the Dog on The Tuckerbox at Gundagai

The next morning, on our way to Parkes we had the opportunity to do a photo opportunity in front of the Parkes Railway Station, what a magnificent building.








Next morning, Wendy, Tony & I decided to have breakfast at the little caffe next to Our Motel.

Group 1: which we were in went to the Dish. The C1 group put on an awesome display in front of the dish, as shown below.








From the Dish and the Car Museum, they did have a display on the Showground. To do an aerial Drone Shot, form there we all met up in the Park for pizza lunch.




Murray presented the American Spirit Award supplied by Jim & Shirley Hornaday From Harvest Alabama to Bob Thomas for his magnificent C1 1953.




The Thomas Family received 10 Awards on the night. Congratulations goes to them and all the NCRS Members that received Awards on the night.





The next day on our drive home, we were given a magnificent sunrise.









Panic Attack

A panic attack are the words to describe my emotions. When I started my corvette and selected drive, to move the car from the garage, to prepare the car for the upcoming Nationals in Parkes in



one week's time.

The Beginning of the story

I had taken the car out for a breakfast run 3 weeks earlier and returned home, reversed the car back into the garage, without any issues.

Then Panic Hits

When I went to drive the car out of the garage, I selected drive, I noticed that the shifter, was moving freely and didn't feel like it was engaging into **drive**. A slight push on the accelerator pedal, confirmed that it wasn't moving, and it was stuck in **park**.

The Reality Sets In

With the sense, of dismay and disbelief, I informed Angie that we may be taking the shopping trolley to the Nationals.

Research and Problem Solving Required


I began to ponder what may have failed and how I was going to rectify the problem, in time for our departure.

I immediately opened the laptop and began searching Corvette Forum sites, for the answers.

The most discussed cause was either the transmission cable broken, or the nylon bushes attached at the end of the cable had failed.

A quick phone call to S R Performance in Sydney, confirmed that this was the most likely. Thanks to Steve (Sharky) advised me on the steps required to confirm.





I have a scissor lift on which I park the Vette on while it's in the garage. I lifted the car and confirmed that the cable and bush, were intact at the transmission end. The next step was to remove the console, a job that I had previously done on two occasions. Next was removing the shifter assembly, from the transmission tunnel (you tube video available on the procedure).

Once removed it was clear, that the nylon bush had disintegrated from the cable eyelet, the spline could not engaged.





In my conversation earlier with Steve, he advised me the if it was the bush, Corvette Corner in Burleigh Heads QLD, had three in stock. I jumped on the web site and ordered the part, this was Thursday, noon. They promptly dispatched and the order was on my doorstep 10.30 the next morning

The Panic is Over

I fitted the part, reassembled and test drove, all was working smoothly and operating as intended.
